Her memory will live on through her paintings which were donated to her friends by her siblings.

FCCA re-enacts Fred's first 4th celebration

For the third year in a row, FCCA opened its doors to visitors with refreshments and colonial-garbed volunteers on July 4.

Over 310 visitors were greeted by enthusiastic hostess Laura O'Leary, dressed as Mrs. James Brown, and by historical interpreter Mike Callahan of Maryland, who represented a very personable Mr. James Brown. Brown invited the townspeople to attend the first Fredericksburg celebration of Independence Day, in 1805, at his home and privately owned "Brown's Island" in the Rappahannock River behind his home. Callahan re-enacted Brown's reading of the Declaration of Independence, as presented that day. The King George Historical Society provided the costumes.

FCCA also had a children's painting table and a face painting station, served refreshments, and Jurgen Brat, grants & fundraising board member, demonstrated creating oyster shell mortar for historic stonework.

Silversmith house

Phase II repairs begin on foundation

Dear Members and Friends,

I hope you are keeping cool during these hot and humid Virginia summer days! I'm excited to report work on the Phase II repairs to Silversmith House has begun. A large debt of gratitude goes to Jurgen Brat who has done such careful research and has devoted so many hours on how to stabilize the deteriorating infrastructure of Silversmith House. Jurgen met with restoration artisans in Williamsburg to determine the formula for mortar that would have been used at the time Silversmith House was built and has hunted down materials that are no longer broadly available.

Jurgen, Dan Ramsey of FCCA's exhibitions team, and the artisans from Two Worlds Restoration are repointing the foundation's mortar inside the subbasement and outside. Additional repairs include replacing the thin basement door (the former door to the stables) with a more robust one, and restoring support beams that are deteriorating. All work will be covered by matching grants and donations.

This summer marks the start of the third year of the Youth Art Program. The children held a lovely show at the Fredericksburg Visitor's Center and served as informed guides to visitors. We thank the Virginia Commission on the Arts for their second grant for this program. Because the Community Give will not be held in 2017, we will have to embark on other fundraising efforts for the program to continue.

All the while, monthly shows in both the Frederick and Members' Galleries continue with top-notch reviews, and FCCA's dedicated docents continue to keep the doors open six days a week. As an all-volunteer organization, FCCA is truly



Margery E. Goldberg has been a major player in the Washington, DC, arts community for more than three decades as an entrepreneur and gallery owner, curator, activist, arts commissioner, guest lecturer, and wood and furniture sculptor. 

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Members' Gallery August Artist

Step out onto the Planet. Draw a circle a 100 feet round. Inside the circle are 300 things nobody understands and, maybe, nobody's ever seen. How many can you find? --Lew Welch, American Poet



Our work began with a desire to look more closely at the earth and to spark questions about invisible processes that operate in nature. In exploring creations such as sea shells, tree knobs, lichen, cloudy vistas, wetland meadows, ice-covered rock, and desert sand, we started to wonder about the imperceptible -- What makes soil smell after a rain? What does photosynthesis look like? What gives shells such complex patterns and shapes? What makes a shoreline shift?

And on and on...

This exhibition doesn't try to answer such questions; rather, it depicts, through photographs and abstract paintings, traces of what ignited our curiosity within those 100-foot circles we drew upon the earth when we went out to play.

The idea for many of my nature paintings began at Shenandoah National Park while hiking with Millie. We go to the park during all four seasons and my work draws from objects, patterns, and colors we find on those hikes, such as decaying trees, dried-out cicadas, mosscovered rock, fresh and stagnant water, and lightning-struck tree bark.

I spent three years in Saudi Arabia, and so the desert also has a special attraction to me; even now I look at sketches and photographs and paint from them. Some of the things that motivate me include: red and white sands; smooth and sharp rocks; mountain ranges; stillness; solitude; hot winds; the feel of dry desert heat; the smell of desert dust; the scent of dry and wet rocks.


I try to paint the feeling of walking through nature. I want to trigger the smells of grass, trees and rocks when dry and when wet. I want to capture the play of sunlight on soil, water and air. This is part of the essence of nature to me, and closeness to nature is important. I like to "push" my paintings from what I see to what I feel – that's why I do abstractions.

I have a BFA in painting from the University of Hartford, Hartford Art School, an MFA in Photography from Ohio University, and I completed the George Eastman House Advanced Studies Workshop in Rochester, N.Y. The Poetry Society of Virginia awarded my poem Solitaire (desert memories, Kingdom of Saudi Arabia), First Prize in the 2016 Ada Sanderson Memorial nature category, in competition with 106 other entries.

When photographing nature, I like to return to the same locations in different seasons, in diverse weather, and at various times of day. Wetlands fascinate me, and so most of the photographs in this exhibition were taken around Jamestown Island and at Big Meadows in the Shenandoah National Park.

Jamestown Island, for example, is compelling because when we cross its bridges at high tide, we find that the incoming water becomes a mirror reflecting sky, clouds, trees, cattails and cordgrass. As the outgoing tide drains the marsh, it reveals a mud floor that, while some consider ugly, is a platform that's vital to soaking up floods, filtering water, and supporting habitats for the amphibious fringe. Mirror and muck form a unity that, with the comings and goings of the tide, reflects the larger ecosystem in which this marsh is nestled and reveals the vitality it hides beneath the water.

I have a BS, MS, and PhD in the area of learning and instruction from Indiana University, where graduate coursework included the study of visual literacy and still photography.

Ray and Millie reside in Williamsburg and are graduates of Virginia Master Naturalist Basic Training. While Millie went on to become a certified Master Naturalist in 2015, Ray hasn't finished the work toward this credential; he remains outside playing and was last seen still circling Big Meadows.


I am still discovering my favorite subject to shoot so I have a wide variety of photos. I hope you will find at least one of my photographs you enjoy.






