Board sets Silversmith House repair priorities

As caretaker, the FCCA continuously maintains one of Fredericksburg's historic buildings, the Silversmith House.

Michael Randall, contractor and Board of Trustees chair of building and grounds, recently assessed the building for future fixes. "I am pleased to find no significant problems with our 228-year-old building," he said. "However, there are several areas in need of repair." To address the needs, Randall and the board established the following priorities:

- 1- Siding: The bad clapboards on the rear, chimney side of the building need to be replaced and sealed.
- 2- Chimney: The chimney needs to be sealed to the building.
- 3- Windows: Most window sills on the lower level need to be repaired, caulked and painted.
- 4- Shutters: All shutters need to be removed and repaired or rebuilt. All need scraping and painting.
- 5- Painting: All siding needs to be scraped and painted.
- 6- Masonry: A long-term goal is to point and repair the building's masonry.

According to Randall, the FCCA received approval from HFFI to replace the clapboards (Priority 1) and is proceeding with obtaining bids to perform the work. "We will continue to move forward in making the repairs, in priority sequence, as funding becomes available," he concluded.

When a work of art is small, we are forced to look closer. Our eyes move towards the piece, resulting in a shared intimacy between the viewer and the artist. As viewers, we quickly discover what the artist has chosen to focus on and what is most important to their trained eye.

As I spent a November day with over one hundred submissions for the It's Small exhibition, I was especially taken by the details that participating artists chose to represent: the turn of face in Tom Smagala's Sienna, the lines of grass in Phyllis Graudszus' The Empty Nest, and the layered branches in Jeanne Tanks' Victims Along the Road. I simultaneously met artists whose love of gesture and color popped off the paper, aluminum, or canvas, as in Charlotte Richard's Tranquil Daze, Jane Woodworth's Ridge Road, Nancy Brittle's The Little Red Steamshovel, and Christine Long's Western Landscape No. 1.

I am so grateful for the opportunity to have served as the juror for the It's Small exhibition, as the experience introduced me to so many wonderful artists from Virginia and talented participants from as far as Arkansas, California, Iowa, North Carolina, Pennsylvania, Tennessee, and Texas. There were many strong works that I was not able to include in the exhibition due of space constraints.

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Wood Turnings BY PHIL HALL

n display in February, will be a number of pieces produced on a lathe – bowls, hollow vessels, vases, urns, goblets, plates, platters, etc. Most are fashioned from local timber felled by storms or arborists, you'll see oak, maple, poplar, cherry, bradford pear elm, walnut, mulberry, red cedar, dogwood, and river birch.

Another somewhat unusual source of wood was the old crib dam uncovered when the Embry Dam on the Rappahannock was dynamited by the Army corps of engineers in February 2004. That wooden crib dam (built in 1854) was submerged behind the concrete one (built in 1910) and its ancient yellow pine and white oak timbers have been retrieved. The beams came from trees 3 to 5 feet in diameter, probably cut and milled near Fredericksburg about the time of its construction. Some of the trees are thought to have been 250 to 300 years old when they were felled, dating back nearly to Columbus' arrival in the New World. Some of the retrieved wood went to Norm Abram of the New Yankee Workshop, but I and other local woodworkers

> got some too. Most of my pieces have a natural tung oil finish but some are dyed or gilded.

I have been turning wood for about five years now and am mostly self-taught. I acquired a wood shop when my wife, Barbara, and I built an addition on our house after I retired in 2004.

Prior to my retirement I was a chemistry professor at Virginia Tech for 17 years and then dean of the faculty and vice president for academic affairs at Mary Washington College for 19 years.

Wood turning is certainly very different from and relaxing to invest time and thought in an undertaking that has such an immediate and

















Clockwise from top: Paris Lovers' Locks, Lonesome Pine, and Old Boat, Annecy.

How Culture Cues Connections:


Metallic photographs tell the story

What cultural cues cause us to connect with certain images or embrace certain thoughts? These metallic photographs, on display in March, intend to draw you into their third dimension and tell a story that connects with a memory or

values you hold constant.

For example, people choose small diners to sit on barstools only an elbow away from the next patron to exchange local news or expectations of tomorrow's weather. It is the intimacy with friends and strangers that diner folks seek. Sharing a drink of water at an ancient stone fountain where all can access a trough to wash hands shows a bond of basic needs. Displaying many



clay pots of beautiful flowers and brightly colored entries are a street side greeting to say "Welcome - come visit!"

A farmer at market can tell you a recipe that enhances the vegetables you prefer or which are in season. A bovine family at pasture reassures us of the source of our milk and cheeses. Small rowboats carry us away to find our dinner, but also bring us back to harbor and maybe share a fish story with friends.

Secret tunnels built through buildings and side streets served bankers and silk merchants in ancient commerce and Resistance fighters 70 years ago. Bridges over the River Seine in Paris display not so secret declarations between lovers with locks fastened to the bridge railing. Upon closer examination, a simple pine defined by Japanese design reflects the beauty of our connections to trees, water and geology in its community garden.

These local institutions and customs reflect our community - a critical tenet of our humanity.
