Grants help repair Silversmith House

Thanks to recent local community grants, the Fredericksburg Center for the Creative Arts was able to make major repairs to its home, the Silversmith House, and provide extended art education.

The Economic Development Agency provided \$10,000 from the City of Fredericksburg; and the Duff McDuff Green Junior Fund granted \$7,500 for repairs. A \$2,000 Government Challenge Grant will be used for the Art Education Outreach Pilot Program, presently in its first year.

In addition, several in-kind donations were also made to cover moisture removal hardware by Plumb Magic Company of Fredericksburg. Abby Construction, of Fredericksburg, supported the project as well. Abby Construction worked on the foundation, sub-basement, basement windows, and outside drainage.

Local funding secures building foundation

Hello Members and Friends!

We've made it through Winter with its unusual cold and snow. Bravo! Now it's time for renewal with flowers and trees blooming, warmer temperatures, and infusions of new energy into our spirits.

A lot has been going on at FCCA. If you've walked along the river behind Silversmith House, you may have seen workmen in the subbasement. Thanks to the generosity of the Economic Development Authority and The Community Foundation, we secured funding to make extensive repairs to our building's foundation. There were cracks through which rain was entering the subbasement. Structural engineers brought to our attention that, in addition to the cracks, the foundation walls were moving inward. Not a good situation! Now, both the drainage of the rain

and movement of the walls have been remediated -- the alley between Silversmith House and the building next door has been graded to keep rain away, and concrete walls were created next to the interior subbasement foundation walls to prevent additional slippage.

Plans for our Youth Outreach Program have been made for the summer, with Adrian Loving teaching once again at the Hazel Hill Community Center. We are looking into having a second session at another community center in a low-income area. There is no fee for the students, with FCCA covering instuctor fees and costs of supplies through donations. Again this year, FCCA will be open July 4th with volunteers in colonial garb welcoming

visitors. Other activities are being planned for that day also. And last but not least, FCCA will participate in The Community Give May 5th. Please mark your calendars for this important fundraising event!



Juror's Statement Reni Gower

I was pleased to be the juror for the March Touch of Red Exhibition at the Fredericksburg Center for the Creative Arts. It was also my pleasure to select the three top awards, as well as a few honorable mentions. Many times in an all-media show, there is not a given theme and it is up to the juror to determine the contextual scope of the show. In this case, it was fun to think about all the work in response to the color red, which also happens to be one of my favorite colors. As you look around the gallery, you will find works executed in many mediums that express a wide range of conceptual and formal possibilities to great effect.


While everyone sees color a bit differently, I suspect we will all agree on the seductive power of this color. Red is often associated with good fortune, love and passion, energy and action. In positive ways, we see red as an assertive, strong, stimulating, exciting, powerful, courageous, or spontaneous color. Sometimes to the contrary, we also "see red" and associate it with anger, aggression, fear, intolerance, violence, brutality, and danger. Delightedly, the works in this exhibition embrace the positive vibes of this versatile and intense color. As such, the artists use the color red...

Most importantly, the color red places the viewer's relationship to the scene. Through its intensity and warmth, red attracts our attention and centers our gaze. It becomes the literal doorway into the scene, which unlocks the emotional content of these works of art. Whether inserted as a figure or abstract shape, red in all of its wonderful manifestations anchors these compositions and guides our interpretations. Ultimately, one wants one's art to be memorable. As the viewer, I want to experience the world through someone else's eyes. Like visual poetry, good work should reveal something new, challenge preconceptions, and enhance our lives. Technique alone was not enough for me to include a piece; rather I was guided by the artist's vision in combination with their expertise. I was drawn to work that prompted me to see or interpret the subjects in a new and fresh way. Ultimately, whether I was viewing painting, photography or sculpture, I looked for surprise and nuance, seeking unique images that remained with me long after the jury process was over.

Reni Gower is a professor in the Painting and Printmaking Department at Virginia Commonwealth University. She's been a practicing artist for over 30 years and also curates award-winning traveling exhibitions.








The Bauhaus was a modern college with an international staff, founded shortly after the end of WW I by Walter Gropius and other international known artists and master craftsman. 

Gallery Talk

Docent Robert S. Hunter recently held a workshop at FCCA for Salvation Army students to learn about the "Touch of Red" exhibit and about the FCCA. The 7th and 8th graders learned how artwork communicates with their own visual language (Lines, Shapes, Values, Textures, and Colors) and how that language was used to express the theme of the exhibition.
