York artists Tom Blackwell and Richard Estes and the deep psychological sensibility of Edward Hopper and visual thrill of Alfred Hitchcock. Her 2009 museum exhibition "Through the Looking Glass" at the Corcoran Gallery of Art featured her Reflections Series, highly complex paintings of reflections on glass storefront windows. The D.C. Commission on the Arts & Humanities, which presently owns 21 of her cityscapes, awarded Mánlapaz a 2014 Artist Fellowship for artistic merit. In 2013, the U.S. Library of Congress acquired her personal papers, correspondences, sketchbooks & exhibition memorabilia for permanent inclusion in the Asian American Pacific Islander Collection. Notably, former First Lady Laura Bush selected the artist to create the artwork for the 2003 National Book Festival. The original painting remains in the collection of the U.S. Library of Congress. Her paintings are widely collected internationally

Her paintings are widely collected internationally by private and corporate art collectors. She performs community service for the elderly through her art workshops at Forest Hills of D.C. and Seabury at Friendship Terrace. The artist is Associate Faculty at the Corcoran School of Art and Design (at George Washington University) and lecturer at The Art League, Va. I'd like to thank Carrol Morgan and the Fredericksburg Center for the Creative Arts for inviting me to act as juror for the All Photography Juried Exhibition. It's been an honor and a privilege to review a remarkably wide range of works from across the region and to then get to know the artists, at least a bit, through viewing the works hung for the exhibition. An overwhelming number of the submissions demonstrated a pursuit for excellence and were of very high quality and professionalism which made the process most difficult but also extraordinarily rewarding.

While there are awards to be given, I want to make certain each artist featured in the exhibition knows how much their individual work contributes to a substantial show filled with insights, challenges and inspiration.

I want to congratulate Heather Martley for her First Place award for Seep/Patuxent Refuge/Christmas Bird Count which not only documents the remarkable landscape of the nature refuge but imbues it with a sense of beauty and mystery that communicates what it feels like to be there, not just what it looks like.

Second Place: Rebecca Carpenter's Curvilinear combines the traditional landscape and figure with a sense of surrealism. The juxtaposition of weathered siding, nude figure, and copper create a dialogue in texture.

Third Place: A Woodford Winter, by Fritzi Newton offers a landscape dominated by abandoned structres which are reminiscent of Edward Hopper's vision.






Growing up in 1950s Los Angeles enabled me to enjoy the warmth of the sun; palm trees; ocean breezes and the sound of cool jazz. And gardens filled with vibrant colors of bougainvillea, roses, camellias and gladiolas. When enjoying the quiet of the day, memories of these sensations lead me to explore color, movement and texture.

Color has a great impact on my art. I love using different medium. My work ranges from representational to abstract. The medium is selected according to my purpose and mood; oil pastels, with their creamy texture and many colors; oil paints to create serenity in representational landscapes; and acrylic paints for the joy of quick strokes and movement to create abstracts.

The only message for me to convey is one of joy. I want the viewer to feel happy, or perhaps intrigued, when they enjoy the color, the movement and the texture of my art.





Joan Wiberg The Art of Color

Plein air painting, or "painting outdoors" is the foundation for all of the paintings included in this show. After many hours spent outdoors observing, I am able to see subtle light effects that I was blind to before. Color changes, shadows shift, light reveals. I search for the proper shade, accurate tint, or calming neutral.

The four seasons in Virginia facilitate this process. The browns and greys of winter give way to the lime greens and hot pinks of springtime, until summer rolls in and turns Virginia all sorts of green. Autumn is almost impossible to capture, with all of nature on fire with color before returning to the dormancy of winter.

The colors in my paintings are the colors that I have learned to see through experience on site and studying how other painters have addressed the landscape. The French impressionists and California Plein Air movement provide guidance when I feel stuck or need inspiration. Beneath all of this, is the gift of having a group, the Fredericksburg Plein Air Painters, to paint with and encourage each other. The city of Fredericksburg and its surrounds provide endless opportunities for subject matter, historically and colorfully beautiful.







PAUL TEBO

My work is essentially reflective, quiet
- a kind of meditation. It is inherently
emotional and thematically consistent. I have
been drawing for 48 years and when people
ask me why I draw, I can only say that it feels
very natural and I enjoy the kind of problem
solving it offers. I don't use computers and
feel it's important to keep this art form alive
even when faster, more efficient ways are
available to create linear work.

I enjoy the methodical tempo of traditional drawing. Over time I have given much thought to what drawing is. It is a collection of abstract marks on a two-dimensional surface that is the result of the struggle between you and the object of interest and concern you are looking at. The drawing becomes a third thing and stands by itself. In the two and three dimensional visual arts, drawing has always been regarded as foundational to good design. As long as I have been working as an artist, I have found this to be true and see drawing as satisfying, not despite its difficulties but because of them. My work brings together and synthesizes distinct three-dimensional elements, e.g. heads, pieces of clothing, a bird or plant... The process itself is mysterious and hard to discuss. My influences range from the Fayum mummy portraits to the work of Mauricio Lasansky and Leonard Baskin. I still look to the draftsmen of the Renaissance and French Academy and to the works of del Sarto, Pontormo, Ingres and so many others for technique and inspiration.

I have done a series of pieces on soldiers from the American Civil War and more recently, the wars of the past two decades. Some have found these images disturbing, but I maintain that the suffering of the soldier is an apt metaphor for the pain that inevitably touches all our lives. My work aims to put that pain in plain sight.
