Allen Reamer lectures feature Colonial, African-American, American West artists

This September, FCCA invites its members to three, two-hour, free lectures by Allen Reamer. The lectures are at the Silversmith House.

American Colonial Painters, Sept. 8, 7-9 p.m. Fredericksburg is rich in colonial and postcolonial history. It is depicted in its styled and folk architecture. This colonial era is also rich in painting. The painting and painters of this time, c.1630 to 1830, became passé and collectors and museums wanted European art. Not until the early 1930s did art historians and later collectors begin to recognize the richness of this time. In this talk we will discuss the education of the painters, how and why this education resulted in the style of their paintings.

A survey of African-American Artists, Sept. 15, 7-9 p.m. During its existence, in the United States there have been many people who have produced art and are African-American. In this talk we will talk about some of these artists. You will learn a little about their lives and we will discuss their diverse styles of art work. We will begin with what an African-American Artist is for the purpose of this presentation. We will start with Colonial artists and continue to Modern artists.

Artist of the American West, Sept. 22, 7-9 p.m. In this lecture we will begin by discussing the roots of Western Art. You will discover that this style had roots in the Eastern United States and combined elements of European art. We will discuss many Western artists and view their work. We will talk about the aesthetic aspects, the compositional aspects, the drawing, the subjects and the color schemes of their work. You will discover what characteristics make an artist, a western artist.

Allen Reamer received a B.A. in art and a Masters of Fine Arts degree in sculpture. His post-graduate work is in art history and education. Allen developed and taught a great variety of studio art and art history courses for thirty-two years before moving to Arizona. During this time he was the president of a state art education association for ten years and very active for a decade with the National Art Education Association. He has been a member or chair of a number of art related boards and has gratefully been recognized in a variety of ways including art teacher of the year, a fellowship to China, letters from President Clinton and a number of other elected officials, plus selling his paintings.

Teresa Blatt *Winning collage artist shows in August exhibit*


Teresa Blatt of North Hills, Calif., retired in 1954 and became a self-taught artist in addition to writing poetry.


In 2001, she began making fiber art to express herself after cancer treatment chemo-brain caused cognitive impairment. She created cloth montages by sewing silk banners inspired by poetry.

After seeing Marcel Marceau perform in 2003, she decided to photograph shadows, reflections and her garden to create "mime on paper" art. She uses cut fragments of laser copies of her photographs to create collages on watercolor paper. Her inspiration comes from literary and narrative arts. "My shadow characters, who seem to me like spirits captured and made visible, have evolved to include color, texture, costume and design, addressing themes of joy, grief, healing and whimsy."

Since 2005, Blatt has exhibited her awardwinning collage art in galleries and juried exhibits throughout the United States. She joined The Fredericksburg Center for the Creative Arts in 2010, where her work has been selected for many juried exhibits and recognized with awards. She has donated numerous original artworks exhibited at the FCCA to silent auctions at the Annual Meetings. Arts people in the literary, theatre, musical and medical arts collect her work, and she uses it for outreach to cancer survivors.

My Philosophy – To me art is not static. Even when I'm working on a series of similar paintings I try not to get stuck on a formula. I allow each painting takes its own direction. When I visit an art museum and look at work that I have seen several times before there will always be something I notice for the first time. The artwork is the same. I have changed. The same thing happens when I'm asked to jury a show. I try not to look at the artwork with any preconceived expectations. The judging process is much like creating a work of art itself. I may begin with a general idea but in the end it's usually something unexpected. And the choices I might make today would be different than the choices I would make six months from now when looking at the same work.

Carolyn Sharon Goodridge, born on October 21, 1960, in Port of Spain, Trinidad, West Indies, immigrated to the U.S. in 1963. She developed an interest in the fine arts at the age of 10, first writing short stories, plays and poems and then expressing herself through songs for the piano and guitar and later focusing on drawing and painting.

Carolyn's formal art education began in 1986 at the Fashion Institute of Technology in New York as a night student in textile design. At FIT she discovered her inexhaustible love of painting. In 1990 she left New York to pursue full time matriculation at the University of Florida. Carolyn was awarded her BFA in Painting from the University of Florida in 1993, and an MFA in Fine Arts from the University of North Carolina, Chapel Hill in 1997.

Carolyn's abstract paintings reflect her progression from realism to abstraction. An avid student of art history, she was inspired by the mystical works of color field artists Mark Tobey, Mark Rothko and Clyfford Still, the whimsical master colorist Hans Hofmann, the musically oriented, German Expressionist Vassily Kandinsky, the exploratory work on dreams and the collective unconscious by Paul Kleé, and the genius of musician John Cage. Studying their works had a liberating impact on her. She began to realize a freedom and reconnection with her love of color and music, legacies of her West Indian culture. Carolyn has been painting with encaustic (pigmented beeswax) since 2003.

She became an exhibiting member of the Charleston Artists Guild in South Carolina and The Art Guild of Burlington in Iowa, and her work was selected for the Iowa Arts Council Traveling Show. She had a successful 20-year career as a Graphic Designer and Art Director and won numerous awards both nationally and internationally for her designs. Iglesias was awarded a prestigious Artist Residency for a month at "Les Amis de la Grande Vigne" in Dinan, France. One of her paintings was selected for the Museum's permanent collection, on exhibition in France during 2013 and again in 2019.

Carol works with oils and soft pastels. Her broad background of traveling has a strong influence on her subject matter. She employs a contemporary impressionistic style and has painted "en plein air" in the U.S. and overseas. She is an award-winning artist who has exhibited her paintings extensively at galleries, museums and shows throughout most of those areas. Iglesias is a signature member of The Maryland Pastel Society, and a member of The American Impressionist Society, Oil Painters of America, and The Pastel Society of America. 

Homecoming on the Avenue

Students and faculty at James Monroe High School enjoy the autumn ritual of Homecoming in the true sense of the word as they march from the modern facility to Maury School, the original home of Fredericksburg High School, founded in 1920. After a morning of dance, games, food and cancelled classes, students put the last touches on their class floats, the band tunes up, everyone begins the long walk down Washington Avenue for a raucous pep rally on the football field of Maury Stadium. Alumni and residents line up along the route to wave and cheer as they pass by the historic icons of our Fredericksburg community - Mary Washington's Meditation Rock, the monument to Religious Freedom, Kenmore, the statue of Hugh Mercer and the Confederate Cemetery.

Marcia Chaves

Doing art and sharing it with the public at the FCCA is more joyful and satisfying than ever before. After the devastating Covid-19 pandemic and my own personal struggle with a broken hip in February, we have all endured social distancing, lockdown and a longing for the company of family and friends.

My most recent paintings have evolved from the difficult circumstances of these six months. Organizing boxes of old photos from decades ago, I was drawn to images of gatherings from many years past - my first birthday at Colonial Beach, July 4th on the bluff overlooking the Potomac at Mt. Moriah Farm, Thanksgiving dinner at our family home, Hillcrest, and the James Monroe High School Homecoming parade on Washington Avenue. I was captured by these scenes of togetherness from long ago, so far removed from today's reality.

In childhood, discovering sharks teeth in the sand, gathering beach glass, and shell fragments among the pebbles have inspired other recent paintings. These offer a close-up view of the exquisite designs of nature in the creatures of the Chesapeake Bay and Outer Banks, and gathered as treasured reminders of summer vacations. I've also included local scenes of our historic surroundings along the banks of the Rappahannock River - the Counting House, the tunnels of Embrey Power, and the Chatham Bridge.

In my current works, I've chosen oil as a medium as it offers a richness of hue and deep saturation of color, evocative of a moment captured in time. Frequently painting over old images, multi layered paint creates texture and depth, leaving traces of old color from the past.

Afternoon Delight -Colonial Beach '45

A photo from the summer of 1945 inspired this image of a quiet afternoon at our family cottage in Colonial Beach, following my first birthday celebration. World War II was still raging, and the year before, my father had left for training in the U.S. Army a few days after my birth, and later arrived in Europe on Christmas of 1944 to endure the Battle of the Bulge. Meanwhile, my mother and I found a loving home with my grandparents who had built the beach cottage on the shores of the Potomac River in 1936. Generations of summer residents spent long afternoons under the quiet shade of mimosas and the Big Band sounds of Glen Miller. Today as we endure a different struggle, and the isolation of the pandemic quarantine, the ephemeral peace of these quiet moments has special meaning.
